

Re: Torn Veils and Empty Tombs

"When is the ending not the end? When a dead man rises from the tomb – and when a Gospel ends in the middle of a sentence." – Dr. Lamar Williamson, Jr., on Mark 16:8

Humans, as a species, are uncertain about uncertainty. The amended endings to Mark's Gospel are proof of that. The "empty tomb" of Easter morning was not enough for first-century believers, nor is it hardly enough for us now. Despite all they had seen, and the empty tomb, believers then and now needed to *see* Jesus for themselves.

The original ending of Mark's gospel is v. 8, "So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had sieved them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid."

Consider, for a moment, if we never hear of Christ's post-resurrection encounters with his disciples. Does it make a difference in our faith and action?

My favorite one-line interpretation of this passage is Dr. Williamson's, quoted above. The ending of our Gospel, no matter how brief, is no ending at all. It is an invitation to finish the story ourselves.

We will always prefer that Jesus be the sole author of the Gospel, as proof of the many edits and endings Mark's Gospel accrued over the years. The weight of the burden of being entrusted with the ending, or at least a small part, of the Gospel story *feels heavy*; perhaps it should.

The call of the faithful Christian, on Easter Sunday and year-round, is to continue writing the ending of this story. What part, big or small, will we play as we live into this call?

Despite its weight, the good news is we are not called to do it alone. We are called to create community and operate within community. Consider this Easter season, who is entombed and in need of someone to roll back the stone? Who is crucified, and needs someone from the crowd to speak on their behalf?





Adult Sunday School - Tom Richardson 9:45 a.m. - 10:30 a.m.


